Old Stephentown Revealed in Recently-Acquired Set of Postcards





Berlin resident Jean Carr recently contributed the two postcards, above, to the Stephentown Historical Society. On the left is District School #7 on Garfield Road, now the home of the Joseph Rieger family. It operated independently until 1951, the last Stephentown school to centralize.

The postcard on the right depicts the Smith Dam, also on Garfield Road. The view is quite different today. From the postmark on the back of this card, both postcards were created in the 1920's and 1930's. SHS Collections and Heritage Center Chair Bev McClave, welcomed these additions to the organizations collection.

The Stephentown Heritage Center 20 Years Ago...



On April 11, 1988, Historical Society representatives (I to r.) Jane Dwyer, President; Ellen Lewis, Treasurer; and Betty Feathers met with lawyer Henry Zwack to sign the papers for the purchase of the 1870 Methodist Church building that was subsequently rehabilitated and is now known as the Stephentown Heritage Center.



The long process of restoring the Heritage Center began shortly after its purchase in 1988. Here, scaffolding has been erected and a pay-loader has been brought in to lift lumber to the roof so that volunteer workmen can repair some lumber in the steeple that was destroyed by carpenter ants and to fix a six inch sag in the roof. Inside, a buttress was also built to shore up beams while repairs were under way.

Initial Cemetery Survey Reveals Debris, Broken Markers, Need for Cleanup and Landscaping Work

Stephentown Historical Society volunteers have been generously donating their time this spring to conduct a comprehensive inventory of more than 40 of our town's 70 cemeteries. It's a daunting task, but one that is long overdue.

Although all surveys were not completed by press time, it is clear from those turned in so far that considerable work needs to be done to rehabilitate some of the neglected, overgrown plots.

"We're so fortunate that so many of our members have volunteered to conduct these surveys," noted SHS President Patricia Flint. "We're especially grateful for those property owners who have agreed to be responsible for maintaining the cemeteries located on their property. Alice LeBlanc, owner of the Stephentown Center Baptist Church property on Calvin Cole Road, for example, worked along with Bill Zimmerman and Bev McClave on May 17th to clear trees and small brush on the site. We are hopeful that others will come forward to 'adopt' a cemetery and to help restore their dignity," she concluded.
