NEWSLETTER TIME CAPSULE AT STEPHENTOWN ELEMENTARY DISINTERRED

In 1984, as part of Stephentown's Bicentennial Celebration, a time capsule was buried in the front lawn of



the Stephentown Elementary School. It was to be opened in 2034 for the 250th Anniversary of the town. With the school building and

land up for sale, the capsule, a full size burial vault donated by Norbert Steggeman was disinterred in June by Aldie Goodermote, Town Highway Superintendent. Sam Catalano, Hall & Higgins Funeral Director inspected the vault and pronounced the seal to be intact.

On Saturday morning, June 8, the cleaned vault provided the backdrop for a ceremony that was attended by about 60 people. Of these people, five were members of the 1984 fifth grade class who worked with the Stephentown Historical Society to fill the vault with 1984 memorabilia. The students were Jarrid Brazie, Kristan Cummings Simpson, Dena Brown Duvall, April Geerholt Smith and Mike Williams. According to a newspaper article of the time and Historical Society records, the vault includes a menu from Picolo Mondo Restaurant, a calendar from the F.N. Brown Insurance Agency, a State Trooper's uniform, Dave Desormeaux's order book, dog biscuits, a railroad spike, an "I Like Ike" pin, horseshoes by Charles Giumarra, an Agway newsletter, some White -Out, Mr. Lewin's ice skates, a Wheaties box, a stamp book, a Post Office badge, a Taconic Telephone book, 1980 Olympics stamps, school books, a Rubix Cube, some Dove soap, Kay Hoffman's Girl Scout pocket calendar, fifth grade artwork, a Teen Titans comic book from Nancy Reagan, Bazooka Squeeze bubble gum and Becky Gutermuth's report of an interview with

local residents and their speculations about transportation change.

Instead of opening the vault on June 8, 2013 as planned, it was decided that the Town Highway Department would store the vault until it is returned to the ground on the Stephentown Memorial Library property. A stone with a bronze plaque that marked the location on the school grounds will be relocated to the new burial site.

Historical Society President, Bill Zimmerman introduced guests at the ceremony. They included fifth

grade teacher, Victor Lewin, head teacher from 1976 to 1990, David Sicko, Principal of the Berlin Elementary Schools and of BCSD, current

Board President James Willis and other former teachers at the school.

Recollections of memories of the teachers and Mr. Lewin's paddle were discussed. Dave Sicko gave a brief history of the school that was opened in 1948. Larry Eckhardt mentioned that more important than the artifacts "are the memories of teachers, fellow students, parents and staff that are embodied in this time capsule".

A second time capsule, from the 1948 building dedication, was reworked in 1998. At the ceremony it was given to the Historical Society for safekeeping until its scheduled opening in 2048 on the 100^{th} anniversary of the Stephentown Elementary School.
