The Babcock Family Restored

Like so many "lost arts", gravestone repair and restoration seems to have fallen by the wayside. Sadly, many of our ancestors' final resting spots have become harder and harder to locate, many times simply because their markers are illegible or have fallen into such total disrepair that they have all but disappeared. Stephentown is home to over 80 (some say 90) cemeteries, with many stones dating back to the 1800's and even the 1700's! Fortunately for us, there are still a few restoration artisans around like **Dave Cummings** who can (and do) step up when the occasion arises. This story is a case in point.

Back in July 2020, a gentleman from Minnesota —Tom Babcock—reached out to the Historical Society's genealogist, Bill Zimmerman, with a request. Mr. Babcock was looking for someone to restore his family gravestones, which had fallen into severe disrepair. Bill sent the request on to the Town Historian, Patricia Flint, who in turn contacted Dave. Dave is well known to have vast knowledge of gravestone restoration and repair and has done quite a bit of it over the years. Dave reached out to Tom Babcock, and so it began.

There were four main stones requiring Dave's attention at the Hillside Cemetery. They are Tom's great-great grandparents, John and Almy (Maxson) Babcock; Charity (Tifft) Babcock (John & Almy's daughter-in-law), married to their son Varnum M. Babcock Sr.); and her daughter Tacy Rowe. Problems ran the gamut: John's stone had fallen over nearly horizontal, requiring an incredibly careful excavation and then a reset that is now sure and plumb. Charity's wasn't as bad—though it was leaning forward, requiring excavation, reset, and cleaning. Tacy Rowe's stone—a lovely one (see photo) - was in the best shape of all—Dave had only to give it a good cleaning. The real challenge was that of Almy Babcock. Mother Nature had not been kind to Almy's marker—it was broken into nine pieces scattered around the plot. Dave felt fortunate that he was able to locate all nine before taking them to his workshop at home. He reassembled the pieces and used a special 2-part epoxy for marble, clamping them together (see photo). Once the epoxy was set, the stone was cleaned and then returned to its spot in Hillside Cemetery.

Please see the "before" and "after" photos to really appreciate the scope of Dave's hard work, dedication and expertise. Once this story is published and the word gets out, I have a feeling that he is going to be very popular and in demand!

The President's Annual Report

The year 2020 started out normally, or so we thought, with the Board of Directors as follows:

COVID 19 was in other countries and not too concerning. Our meetings continued until March when the world stopped. The seriousness of the pandemic hit everyone and everything was cancelled—the Railroad Exhibit, the Strawberry Festival, the July picnic, and the monthly meetings. We learned safety precaution, and, wearing masks and staying socially distanced, three of us cautiously resumed our work on Fridays. We and our few visitors wore masks and stayed apart. Our bi-monthly board meetings turned to Zoom. This long-distance format allowed us to continue meeting, but it also presented problems for members who had issues with the new technology or lacked the necessary equipment. During this time, the Vice President carried on with her Welcome Bag project for people new to town. The bags contain a box of scenic note cards of historic Stephentown buildings and landscapes; The SHS No. 5 Album; information regarding trades people, organizations, voter registration, town services—approximately 45-50 items in all. Ironically, with the COVID scare, people are moving from crowded cities to more open places like Stephentown. Four gift bags were distributed when we were able to identify the new home owners in town.

Our Town Historian worked tirelessly to honor the American Revolutionary Soldiers from Stephentown. At the annual Veterans Day program, sixteen soldiers were remembered with historic markers from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation that were eventually placed at the six cemeteries where they are interred.

Special thanks go out to Alan Stuart, whose generosity allowed us to hold a fund raiser at the NEW SCRUB BOARD Car Wash. This event was a rousing success and a welcome break from COVID tedium.

Along with the discouraging year of COVID, when it came time to present a slate of officers for the new year, both the office of President and Treasurer could not be filled. At the November board meeting it was voted to keep the current officers in place until June when, hopefully, things will open up and the Nominating Committee can continue its search.

Many protocols had to be overlooked this year because of the extenuating circumstances, but we look forward to a new, healthier, and safer year when we can resume our meetings and gatherings.

Did you know.....??? CREW BAILS OUT OVER STEPHENTOWN Submitted by Bev McClave) Shortly after 8 o'clock on the night of February 10, 1945 the crew of an Army AT-11 transport plane bailed out over Stephentown and landed safely except for one broken ankle.

The four man crew was enroute from the Army Air Base in Sioux City, Iowa, to Westover Field, MA. Their radio went out, and the pilot had virtually been lost for three hours, until the gas was nearly gone. With only five minutes of fuel left, and at an altitude of 8,000 ft., the crew parachuted into the Stephentown/Garfield area.

First word of the incident was when the pilot, Lt. Raymond Egan of Holyoke, MA, who landed in a tree, reached the home of Harold Wemple. Pilot Egan walked about two miles to reach the Wemple home. One of the crew landed near the home of Roderick Calder on upper West Street and the other two came down in the vicinity of Harold Rathbun's home. Trooper Earl Hanchett of New Lebanon was the first to reach the Wemple home, accompanied by Gus Johnson of Stephentown. They picked up pilot Egan and drove to the Calder place where they found Lt. Irwin who was the only one injured. The other two crew members were Capt. Winfield Scoville and Lt. Walter Givan. All four of the crew were finally reunited at Doctor Greene's.

ROADSIDE MARKERS DEDICATION

It was an unusually beautiful fall afternoon (72 degrees!) on November 7, 2020 — just perfect for a very special day of celebration. The program began with a Veterans Day commemoration as befitting our local heroes—speeches by town and local officials, veterans, and other dignitaries; the Presentation of Colors and Wreaths by Elizabeth Goodermote (president of DAR) and David Flint (treasurer of SAR) (see photo) to remember our fallen soldiers, as well as veterans past and present; and gun salutes by the Color Guard of the Saratoga Battle Chapter SAR. Once "the smoke cleared", our Town Historian, Patricia Flint, was introduced. Pat told everyone about a grant from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation which allowed the town to receive six markers honoring sixteen Revolutionary War Patriots who are interred in six cemeteries throughout Stephentown. The markers were unveiled by Veterans and members of the SHS cemetery committee during the day's festivities and later placed in their spots. Many thanks to Pat for all of her hard work and dedication that made this happen. We would also like to thank all the others who organized and participated, and attended as well. A special thanks to "Dave's Market", who provided the cider and donuts!


Refreshments for Programs
