This beautiful house was built by Dr. G. H. Dickinson, one of the very well liked physicians in the 1840's. He named it "Breezy Nook". The house was later owned by Calvin H. Atwater who operated his lumbermill here until his death in 1947; now owned by Georgian Beebe.

#### **ALBUMS**

Our featured album this month is #1, titled simply "Stephentown Historical Album". It opens with a short history of the town, authored by Janet Atwater. What follows is a gathering of pictures from the earliest years of photography right up to 1977 when the album was published. Photos include streets scenes, homes, farms, countryside panoramas, as well as commercial establishments, the railroad, automobiles of the day, and horses pulling all kinds of equipment. You'll see one-room schoolhouses and their classes, and terrible floods. This album is a great snapshot of "the way it was back when". We think you'll recognize a lot and will say "I remember that!" or "whatever happened to that?" more than once.

COVID continued to be a concern early on, so it was deemed wise to reschedule programs for the first quarter, resuming in April when numbers declined and mandates were lifted. Programs have been extremely well attended, a testament to the quality of our speakers thanks to our Program Committee, as well as the strong interest in our history from the community. AND – thanks to the donation of a camera - we are now recording our speakers and posting the videos on YouTube for those unable to attend in person.

This year was a busy one for the Historical Society. In January, thanks to tech advisor Brad McClave we migrated to Microsoft 365's free software for nonprofits, improving communication among the board's officers, and allowing for cancellation of our Zoom subscription (we now use **Teams**, a savings of \$149.00 annually). **Appreciation Pins** were designed and ordered – a program spearheaded by Pat Flint, Town Historian, as a small means to show our gratitude to volunteers. Lighting at the Heritage Center was updated and plastic sheeting replaced on the steeple, both much-needed capital improvements, along with a new lawn mower. March saw a change in our financial reporting and accounting as we moved to Quickbooks Online, which gives us an improved picture of SHS activities and economics. Another improvement was the purchase of a "Square" credit carder reader, which eases cash flow issues and helps to improve inventory/sales reports. It has been linked to the website, dramatically increasing the sale of online items such as albums, and has provided another means for donations and membership renewals. Additional storage for archived items was achieved thanks to shelving donations of by two local residents, and the Center's alarm system was upgraded at a substantial annual cost savings. A new line of T-Shirts was designed and purchased, proclaiming our town to be once again "The Only Stephentown on Earth" – both online and in house sales have been quite brisk. The **Strawberry Festival** enjoyed its most profitable year ever – perhaps due in part to strong support from local vendors, making it possible to purchase new signage and banners, increasing awareness and participation in this event. The same went for the Annual Car Wash – a catchy new banner and signage helped to get the word out there. The Summer Picnic featured a **BBQ** this year – a great idea from the Program Committee with chicken donated by Dave's Market. For the first time, the event was held under our own tent at the Heritage Center. Attendance was phenomenal, the day was grand and Appreciation Pins were awarded. In July, in conjunction with the library, we participated in a first-ever Welcome Reception for new residents who were presented with an SHS Welcome Package. At our Annual Holiday **Luncheon** in December, special holiday gift bags containing albums and note cards were given to attendees to everyone's delight, ours included.

**Also of note**: a donation of 200 gallons of fuel oil by a member; sales of donated items at Meissner's Auction House; and sales of SHS items at both Dave's Market and Braveheart Books.

On the less-than-positive side, in October, routine painting turned into major sill/foundation repairs on the south side of the building. Looking on the bright side, it was caught in time and restored before irreparable damage could be done.

Looking forward to a happy, healthy, and prosperous 2023!

#### **MAINTENANCE (AND REPAIR!)**

As is our usual practice, in order to keep up with the seemingly never-ending maintenance of the Heritage Center, we made plans to paint the south side and addition on the back of the building. Simple, right? WRONG! To make a long story short, when workers began, they soon found more than they bargained for. Serious issues were found with the sill, foundation, and insulation (see the "before picture"). After over 140 years in existence, all kinds of weather, and powder post beetles, the boards and foundation were a dry, crumbling mess—they had to use a crow bar in places to pry out the old beams, and they had to actually jack up the building in some places! The outside of the sill was caulked with foam and finished with metal (2 clapboards were removed and the metal now extends down over the sill). Kirk Mitchell and his crew did a fantastic job and we appreciate them. See the "after" photo. While it certainly was an unexpected and costly expense (thank goodness for our generous fund drive donors!), we are grateful that it was caught in time and restored before irreparable damage could be done. We'll check the other sides in the spring, but we don't expect to find damage to the same extent, simply because they don't get direct sun or constant motion.





#### ACCOUNT WITH MEISSNER'S AUCTION HOUSE

A big thank you is in order to Vice President Kat Deen, who has been working with Meissner's Auction House in New Lebanon to sell miscellaneous "treasures" that various members donated throughout the year. 2022 saw revenue of almost \$500 from SODI (sale of donated items). Now we have our own consignment account! Any items accepted will bring 80% of the sale price to the Stephentown Historical Society. #### Sayings & Customs from a much simpler time:

#### The Wedding Bouquet:

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and still smelled pretty good by June. However, since they were starting to smell, brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hid the body odor.

# Hence, the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married. <u>Raining Cats and Dogs:</u>

Houses had thatched roofs with thick straw piled high and no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained, it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof.

Hence the saying: "It's raining cats and dogs".

#### **Canopy Bed:**

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

Hence: a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection.

#### **Thresh Hold:**

Only the wealthy had something other than a dirt floor. They had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As winter wore on, they added more thresh until when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance-way.

#### Hence, A Thresh Hold

#### Pease Porridge Hot, Pease Porridge Cold and Chew the Fat:

In those old days, people cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables and didn't get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over again the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for guite some time.

# Hence, The Rhyme—Pease porridge hot, pease porridge cold, pease porridge in the pot nine days old.

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could bring home the bacon—They would cut off a little to share with guests, and would all sit around and "Chew the fat".

#### **Upper Crusted:**

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the "Upper Crust".


